Notable Residents

This article continues our series highlighting important people buried at The Evergreens Cemetery.

The Evergreens Cemetery recently discovered that two survivors of the Titanic disaster are buried here. The Titanic sank on April 15, 1912, on its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York City after colliding with an iceberg, resulting in the deaths of more than 1,500 people.

We would like to thank British researcher Trevor Baxter for bringing these two survivors of the sinking of the Titanic to our attention. Mr. Baxter says "I have been researching the Titanic for 30 years. For the last nine years I have been very interested in the stories of passengers and crew, which led me to locating grave sites and memorials around the world and to keep their memories alive. I have located some 600 grave sites and memorials and there are still more to locate – one day I would like to put a book together including photos, and a little information on each photo of the passenger or crew member."

August Abraham Johannes Abrahamsson (1892 - 1961)

August Abraham Johannes Abrahamsson was born in Finland in 1892. He boarded the Titanic as a third class passenger at Southampton, travelling to New Jersey, where his brother lived. He shared a cabin with five other Finnish men. He survived the disaster, escaping the sinking ship on one of the last lifeboats, and was rescued by the RMS Carpathia and taken to New York to St. Vincent's hospital. He went back home to Finland until 1914, when he returned to America, marrying a Finnish woman who had spent time in America. They settled in Brooklyn, where he worked as a ship's carpenter. He became a naturalized U.S. citizen in 1919. Abrahamsson died in 1961, aged 69, and is buried with his wife Martha in The Evergreens Cemetery.

Aurora Adelia Landergren Johnson (1889 - 1947)

Aurora Adelia Landergren was born in Sweden in 1889, one of seven siblings. In 1912 she decided to emigrate to New York,

and purchased a ticket for the Scandinavia-America Line's Fredrik VIII, departing from Denmark. On her way to Denmark she traveled with two fellow Swedes who convinced her to come with them to England instead to depart. They found themselves rebooked on the Titanic in Southampton when their original vessel was unavailable because of a coal strike in Britain. Landergren survived the disaster, and was rescued by the RMS Carpathia and taken to New York. She married Simon Frederick Johansson, a fellow Swede, in 1922. They remained in New York, settling in the Bronx where her husband worked as a handyman, and anglicised their surname to Johnson. She died in 1947, aged 58, and is buried with her husband in The Evergreens

In addition, we will hold our first Arbor Day celebration, which includes a tree planting, a tree identification walk, art activities and a tree-climbing demonstration by a professional arborist. We are not only a historically significant site, but also one of New York City's great urban forests, and we are dedicated to utilizing our green space for outreach and education. Exhibition: Triangle Factory Fire Memorial Quilt

To commemorate the 107th anniversary of the Triangle Waist Factory Fire The Evergreens Cemetery is displaying Robin Berson's memorial quilt for the month of March.

The Evergreens is the final resting place of several victims of the fire, which claimed a total of 146 lives on March 25, 1911. The Triangle Fire Memorial to the Unknowns marks the final resting place of previously unknown victims of the fire.

We are proud to honor these victims, as well as the many others who died in the tragic fire, by displaying this quilt in our office lobby.

The quilt on display is one of one of two quilts in the Workers Memorial Quilts series by author, quilter and historian Robin Berson. These quilts honor garment workers who died approximately a century apart in the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire and those from the Tazreen fire and Rana Plaza collapse of 2012 and 2013 in Bangladesh.

Staff Spotlight with Eva Bowerman, Director of Programs

How long have you been involved at The Evergreens?

I have been Director of Programs here since August 2017.

What does your position consist of?

My primary role is to bring visitors to the cemetery for a wide variety of programs, such as stargazing, tree walks, bird walks, yoga classes, holiday events for families, historical walking tours, and many other programs. In collaboration with my colleague Veronica Willis I come up with ideas for programming and implement them; I'm involved in all stages of planning, publicity, registration and check-in. An important part of my position is creating and maintaining partnerships with other organizations in the community. I maintain our Facebook page and mailing list, and also give tours of the art and architecture of the cemetery. I'm also the designer and editor of our quarterly newsletter, and am currently working on content for our website, which we are completely updating.

What is your background?

My background is in the history of art and architecture, and I've worked in art museums in the past. I became interested in cemeteries several years ago, and became involved with an organization called the Association for Gravestone Studies (AGS), a non-profit devoted to the study and conservation of gravestones and cemeteries. I'm on the board of the national organization, and am also chair of the New York Chapter of AGS. I organize several meetings a year, as well as smaller events, for the chapter. My experience with AGS has been invaluable for my work at The Evergreens.

What is most rewarding about your position?

When I started at The Evergreens the cemetery was just starting to hold events, so it's been exciting to develop a slate of programming almost from scratch. I enjoy finding innovative ways for the community to enjoy this beautiful, historically significant place. I enjoy forging and deepening partnerships with organizations and individuals in the community. The position allows for a lot of creativity in conceiving of and implementing events, as well as finding ways to make the community aware of them. I feel very lucky to work in such a beautiful place, and to have the chance to bring other people in to appreciate the cemetery as well.

What is most challenging about your position?

Since we are still in the fairly early stages of developing our programs it can be challenging to draw people in – people aren't necessarily used to coming to a cemetery for events. I'm committed to outreach and publicity, and we are continually finding ways to let people know about our diverse offerings. At our Easter party last year we had over 500 visitors, and it was wonderful to see so many people enjoying our space and know that our efforts at outreach were effective!

Where do you live?

I live in Astoria

What do you like to do in your free time?

I like spending time with my husband and 9-year-old son, and enjoy museums, reading, yoga, cooking and traveling. I love visiting cemeteries and frequently go to other cemeteries in NYC to explore and take photos.

Employee Recognition Program

On January 1 the Evergreens launched a new employee recognition program intended to foster teamwork and motivation among the grounds maintenance crew members. Employee recognition forms are available in the break room at the maintenance building, and employees are encouraged to recognize their fellow employees whenever they see an act that is above and




beyond the regular 'call of duty'. Every week management selects a nomination, and during the Friday lunch break the winner is awarded a gift card to Dunkin' Donuts, Subway or elsewhere. A gift card is also given to the person who submitted the winning nomination.

This initiative is contributing to a supportive work environment, based on teamwork, among the grounds maintenance crew. According to Superintendent Henry Nunez "we are always looking for new ways to keep the troops motivated and in sync with the "Team First" culture."
