Wing On Hom (1924-1944)

On October 11, 2023, The Evergreens Cemetery had the honor of interring WW II hero Wing On Hom. He was laid to rest next to his parents and brother.

Wing On Hom was born on January 10, 1924. Private Hom entered the United States Army in Boston and served in WW II. In February 1944, Hom was assigned to B Company, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division. On February 2, 1944, Hom went missing while his unit was engaged in defensive fighting against German Forces near the town of Cisterna di Latina, Italy. After his body was not recovered and he was not reported as a prisoner of war, the War Department declared Hom dead on February 3, 1944.



In 1946, a set of remains were found three miles west of Cisterna. The remains could not be positively identified, and they were interred at the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery. A Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) historian believed that the set of remains could possibly be Hom's. In September 2021, the remains at Sicily-Rome American Cemetery were disinterred and sent to the DPAA laboratory at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska. The remains were formally identified on April 6, 2023. Hom's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at Sicily-Rome American Cemetery where a rosette has been placed next to his name, indicating he has been accounted for. Hom was posthumously awarded a Purple Heart and a Bronze Star.

On October 11, veterans groups, FDNY Phoenix Society, NYPD's 5th Precinct and honor guards, alongside Hom's family, came to pay their final respects to Private Hom in a beautiful gravesite service.



The Evergreens Cemetery Celebrates its 175th Anniversary

The Evergreens Cemetery is proud to celebrate its 175th anniversary next year. Founded in 1849 as a non-sectarian cemetery, The Evergreens was designed by renowned landscape architect Andrew Jackson Downing in the 'rural' style. The historic chapel, now the cemetery office, was designed by architect Alexander Jackson Davis in the Gothic Revival style. The Cemetery is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Over 532,000 people are buried here, including notables such as cartoonist and animator Winsor McCay, jazz musician Lester Young, painter Martin Heade, tap legend Bill "Bojangles" Robinson and Thomas "Blind Tom" Wiggins, and chess champion Wilhelm Steinitz.

The Evergreens has from its inception been a place of inclusiveness, welcoming those of all races, ethnicities and religions. The cemetery is notable for being the first in New York City to bury members of the Chinese community, who due to discrimination were prohibited from being buried at other cemeteries at the time. Many others who faced discrimination due to their professions, such as actors, musicians and authors, are also interred at The Evergreens.

"As we look ahead to this milestone, we reflect on the importance of our core values" says The Evergreens Cemetery President Julie Bose. "Our inclusiveness and diversity are what make us unique. Our burial spaces have always been available to all people, including those who were not allowed to be buried at other cemeteries. From our founding 175 years ago to today, we have welcomed a wide variety of people to be interred in peace and harmony alongside each other."

One especially significant burial site belongs to previously unknown victims of the Triangle Shirtwaist Fire. The 1911 factory fire, which was the deadliest industrial disaster in the history of New York City, claimed a total of 146 lives. The monument "Triangle Fire Memorial to the Unknowns" marks the final resting place of six victims who were unidentified until recently. The memorial, featuring an expressive carving of a mourning woman, was created in 1912 by Evelyn Beatrice Longman.

The Evergreens, covering 225 acres and containing over 3,000 trees, is accredited as a Level II Arboretum. Home to many bird species due to its extensive tree canopy, the cemetery is a popular spot for birders.

The Evergreens has a robust slate of public programs, including tree walks, stargazing, history tours and events for families such as an annual Arbor Day celebration. Recent events include a bird walk for Black Birders Week in partnership with NYC Audubon and New York Restoration Project and a tour on Chinese Heritage at The Evergreens for Asian American and Pacific Islander

Heritage Month with the Urban Park Rangers. "We're thrilled to invite the public to enjoy our serene green space and celebrate our heritage while serving our community through our innovative public programming." says Bose. "Our 175th anniversary allows us to reflect on our past as we look towards the future."

Board Spotlight

Interview with Meredith B. Jenkins

Meredith Jenkins serves on the Investment Committee of The Evergreens Cemetery Board of Trustees. She is Chief Investment Officer at Trinity Church Wall Street.

When did you first join the board, and how did you become involved?



I just joined, so my first meeting was in October. I was invited about a year and a half ago by several board members, Fred [Bland], Dennis [Sullivan] and Bill [Cline]. I've been really impressed by everyone I've met so far, and the people I already knew are people I have a lot of respect for, and enjoy spending time with. What other boards are you on?

I'm on the Josiah Macy Foundation and the Windward School Board. I will be starting in the spring on the investment committee for the Grosvenor Estate in London.

What do you like to do in your free time?

I love to travel. My family lived abroad in Hong Kong for four years, and I'm a huge fan of getting around the world and traveling with my family. I have three boys, now almost all grown up, but love to spend time with them when they'll have me. On weekends, when possible, we like to go to Shelter Island. And I love to read.
